

#### The Early Days

This March 14, 2003 meeting of the Western Carolina Botanical Club provides an opportunity to celebrate the 30th anniversary of this remarkable organization.

The inspiration for the founding of the Botanical Club can be traced to a series of wild-flower classes taught in Brevard during the fall of 1972 by Dr. C. Ritchie Bell, then Professor of Botany at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. The enthusiasm generated by the experience prompted one of the class to suggest that the group "get together regularly and go out to various interesting places to look at flowers and other plants". And that is what the Club has been doing ever since.

The purposes of the Club were recently rewritten to add a statement on conservation but basically the purposes are identical with those articulated 30 years ago. They are:

- 1. To study, enjoy and appreciate the plants of Western Carolina in their natural environment.
- 2. To compile data on the plants of Western North Carolina and disseminate such data to interested persons.
- 3. To encourage members and the public to protect plants, especially native plants, and to preserve the habitats in which they are found.

Holmes Educational State Forest.


Millie Blaha led a group of Club members in a project to list the plants at the Forest. This was a two-year project.

Buck Springs Trail
Under the leadership of Dick Smith and Elton Hansens, a one mile trail segment was developed as a self guiding interpretive botanical tour with an accompanying brochure. More than 200 species of plants were identified and 24 designated on numbered posts.

The Cradle of Forestry. Eight members working in two teams visited the Cradle weekly during two growing seasons to survey the plants along the Biltmore Campus Trail and the Forest Festival Trail. Members were: Bonnie Arbuckle, Peggy Ellis, Elisabeth Feil, Betty Jones, Elaine Montgomery, Erika Parmi, Helen Smith and Anne Ulinski. The Club received a U.S. Forest Service Certificate of Appreciation for this project.
